



Pastor's Corner

"Just as the Father has loved me, I have loved you. Now remain in my love. If you obey my commands, you will remain in my love."

Jesus words captured in John 15:9-10a

I am looking forward to getting to know all of you, serve with you and discover more of what Jesus is inviting us to experience in this passage.

We can intellectually know God loves us and still respond obediently like we have been given a list of things we need to do and then work really hard to not let God down. But God is not a demanding taskmaster or a distant deity whose approval we need to gain. God's love for us was established before creation and definitively declared through the cross.

Read again how Jesus describes the goal of obedience in this passage from John 15. Obedience to Jesus' commands is meant to help us experience and remain in God's love. Jesus is inviting us to let God love us into becoming people of love. [i]

The English word "obedience" comes from the Latin word ob-audire, which means to listen with great attentiveness [ii]. If we don't take time to listen, we can miss hearing God's loving, transforming words to us. This type of listening takes faithful effort; great attentiveness. Our consumer oriented, productivity inclined, digitally focused culture makes a lot of noise which distracts our attention. We can also think this prayerful listening is only possible for a few saints like Mother Teresa or Billy Graham. But Jesus said these words to a group of ordinary, imperfect people who in many ways were not unlike you and me.

In the days ahead how might we listen with great attentiveness to what God has for us individually and collectively? How might we interact with our family, neighbors and people at work with this attentiveness to God who is actively loving us and them?

This past August our daughter Danica was married to her husband Ryan. The weekend was a wonderful celebration of God's faithful love throughout our lives. The family and friends who joined us were people who had helped us stay attentive to God during the exhausting days of early childhood and through the angst of teenage years. They were part of a larger faithful community that encouraged us to listen amidst all the distractions of life. The wedding was a joyous celebration that increased our desire to keep listening with great attentiveness and increasingly remain in God's love.

Jesus next words indicate that this type of celebration is exactly what God desires for us. In John 15:11 He says, "I have told you this so that you will have the same joy that I have. I also want your joy to be complete." My wife Tori and I look forward to celebrating with you how God will make our joy more complete as we continue to let God love us into becoming a people of love.


- Thank you to all who helped with the planning and volunteering to serve during the luncheon

There are six passages in scripture, the "clobber" passages, that have often been used by mainline churches to exclude men and women in the LGBTQ+ community. The book **UnClobber** by Colby Martin reexamines each of those six passages to see what the Bible says and doesn't say about homosexuality. **UnClobber** will be the basis for a ten-week adult education class beginning Sunday, February 2. Together we will study the Biblical teachings and interpretations in Martin's book as well as share our own stories and questions around this critical and divisive issue.


Some of the questions we will be addressing include:

- Who and how does God call us to love?
- What do we do when our hearts and our heads don't seem to align with what we read in scripture?
- What is at stake when we exclude marginalized communities?

- Week 8 (March 23) 1 Timothy 1:10
- Week 9 (March 30) Catch Up
- Week 10 (April 6) Summary

The Westminster Confession states, "all believers, are therefore, under obligation to sustain the ordinances of the Christian religion where they are already established, and to contribute by their prayers, gifts, and personal efforts to the extension of the Kingdom of God throughout the whole earth".

NEW LIFE

In spite of the news turning to other events, we do not forget the transforming work still being done in Afghanistan through the addiction treatment program, New Life, a project of Morning Star Development. Jon and Marita Bishop have first hand experience with the importance of this ministry. You are join in that through prayer and financial support

In a country of estimated 4 million addicts, New Life under the direction of John Koehler and the power of God's love, is mentoring successful recovery, transforming lives, restoring families. This year, fifteen men are participating in the arduous but freeing one year long experience. The program requires commitment to group living, working through the 12 steps, learning new understanding of themselves and God's grace. Since the origin, thirty-seven men have graduated, eleven of whom are taking leadership in the program.

God at Work: The government, realizing New Life has a better success rate than their own programs, has now approved adding a second site in Bamyan as well as Kabul. An exciting opportunity that you are supporting in prayer and funding. Thank you for making a difference in families half way around the world!

One of the hardest tasks I face this month is to notify the congregations he so faithfully served that their Pastor Peter is finally at peace in the arms of his Lord. After a long, hard battle with cancer, and weakened by radiation treatment, he developed pneumonia in both lungs and succumbed to acute respiratory failure at Providence Hospital on December 13, 2024.

Joshua, Rosie and I have cried through too many boxes of Kleenex and laughed over so many memories this past month as gathered to mourn our loss and rejoice in the gift we have been given. And when our spirits become too heavy with mourning, we remember that he is finally free of the pain that he endured these past few years. Then one of us will say that we should be happy that he is in that better place, but what do you think that place is like? Is he sleeping, is he singing with the saints in glory, or is he shaking hands and hugging those friends and family who arrived before him. I can just picture him being greeted by Oma, his sturdy German mother whose stories made their way into so many of his sermons, and I can hear her voice saying, "Peter! You and 'Chimmy' Carter arriving at the same time! This is a doppel blessing! Gott sei dank!"

So with Oma we say, thanks be to God for the gift of Peter Notehelfer and the mark he has left on our life of faith!

Please share my news with the congregation as you see fit. I know that there are many in the church who never met Peter, but for those who knew him and loved, tell them to rejoice that his battle is over and he is beginning his better life in the presence of his God.
