
Come and See




Upcoming Events!

**Christmas Celebration
at Neah Bay PC
Saturday, December 13th**



You are invited to celebrate the Birth of the Prince of Peace with our Makah sisters and brothers in Christ at Neah Bay PC on Sat, Dec 13. This is a 40+ year bridge of friendship with the Makah Tribe of Neah Bay on the far northwest corner of the Olympic Peninsula.

Presbytery of Yukon and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance

The west coast of Alaska was hit by remnants of tropical typhoon Halong, generating high winds and sea surge that inundated communities and damaged homes and infrastructure. At least 49 communities reported being impacted.

The two hardest hit communities, Kipnuk and Kwigillingok, are in an area near the Bering Sea that saw water levels more than 6 feet above the highest normal tide line. This disaster isn't "just flooding," Schultz said (Rev. Elizabeth Schultz, Executive Presbyter). "This unprecedented evacuation of the entire population of two villages and those families and communities are being brought to hub communities around



the state, one of which is Anchorage, where the presbytery office is. We will be in direct care of hundreds of people that are now being brought to Anchorage because their villages are not safe to inhabit at the moment." In addition to flooded homes, there has been damage to power and communications systems, roads, and boardwalks, a runway, and other infrastructure, according to Alaska officials.

Schultz explained the importance of PDA's involvement this way: "Not only is it financially going to be helpful, it sends a message to all of our ecumenical partners that this denomination cares about these communities, even though they are in places most people in the lower 48 have never heard of," she said. "There is a huge faith presence in our Alaska Native villages, and it sends that needed message that they are not alone." In September, the Church received \$52,446 in total operating income and had total expenses of \$51,822 resulting in a net profit of \$624 from operations, compared to an expected net loss of \$6,121. Year-to-date income is under budget by \$6,560. As of September 30, the Church has total assets of \$1,295,423 and continues to be debt-free.

SESSION CORNER - OCTOBER 2025

The Session meeting on October 6 began with Marita Bishop leading reflection and prayer around Matthew 11:28-30. We then approved the following items:

- Special Session Meeting 10/20 to review TCI Assessment results
- Congregational Meeting 11/23 to elect Elders and Deacons
- Director of Youth Job Description
- Ministry team, committee, clerk, and task force reports
- Women's Tea 5/16/2026
- Neah Bay Christmas Party 12/13
- Visitation and Care Ministry Team Description
- Baptism of Anna Rose Mentzos 11/2
- 8 PNC nominees to be presented to the congregation for approval

They received updates and discussed next steps in Strategic Planning Areas:

- Facilities: reported work related to the Victory Garden, HVAC and Piping work in the Ed wing.
- Communications: shared goals of inviting new people, increasing Facebook posts, and strengthening regular communication in written and verbal forms. Please send pictures of events to Kate West. A desire to strengthen our ministry to guests and new people was also shared.
- Youth and Family: Talea is communicating with parents regarding ways to strengthen the ministry to the youth. There has been positive feedback about Wonder-full Worship.

Pastor Tom provided updates on Nominating Committee work, communicating to the congregation about the Sanctuary Refresh project, 21 leaders pledging \$60,000 to this project, 100 persons took the TCI survey (over a 90% response rate!), average Sunday in-person attendance this year of 91 people.

Session discussed ways to continually grow in being a community that is better able to welcome people who are different from ourselves. The Three Practice Sessions Mary Beth Kurtenbach is leading with all Ministry Teams and Committees is a valuable way for us to continually learn these skills.

Carlene Crossman has begun to lead us in the work of following up with people who have not been involved over the past year. In the next month Session members will be contacting people as well as updating our membership accordingly.

Please pray for Session as they focus in upcoming meetings on budgeting and long-range strategic planning.
